The La Jolla Ranche District dates from the early 1900s. Located on Yellow Jacket Pass, the district consists of a log shed, thought to be the original homestead cabin; a western-style bank barn, constructed in 1910, and the 1.5-story log bungalow, built before 1912. The three wooden Tuscan columns on the front porch and the large, multi-paned front windows are character-defining features of the house. A large Engelmann spruce tree in front of the house and a row of mature flowering crabapple trees along the road to the north add to the district's historic resources. For several decades in the early 1900s, the La Jolla Ranche was a popular stopping place for stagecoach and automobile travelers and was well-known for its delicious meals. The La Jolla Ranche District retains its historic integrity as a landmark along the Wolcott-to-Steamboat Springs stage route, which accesses Stagecoach Lake State Park.
